Answer 1

Striae distensae (stretch marks).

Answer 2

Striae distensae is a benign skin condition that does not cause any medical problem except anxiety to the patient. It is caused by continuous and progressive stretching of the skin leading to excessive mast cell degranulation with subsequent damage to elastin and collagen. In adolescents, it is usually as a result of a growth spurt. Common affected areas are the abdomen, buttocks, thighs and knees.

Answer 3

Striae distensae is usually of a cosmetic concern. In adolescents, the condition may improve and the striae become less obvious with time. Reassurance is necessary to allay anxiety. Topical retinoids have been shown to be effective in some patients.¹
