# Answer 1

Tinea corporis (tinea circinata, tinea glabrosa, ringworm of the body).

#### Answer 2

Infection is acquired from an active lesion of an animal, by direct human contact (*Trichophyton rubrum*), or rarely, from soil.

#### Answer 3

Differential diagnoses are:

- contact eczema
- seborrheic dermatitis
- erythema multiforme.

# Answer 4

Topical antifungal creams or lotions especially miconazole, detoconazole, clotrimazole and ciclopirox olamine – are available for small localised areas. In resistant or widespread infections oral treatment is indicated.
