The RACGP exists to support members in providing the best comprehensive, planned and proactive primary care for their patients.



By the end of 2022, the RACGP will:

- have a highly relevant and personalised member experience – improve the member experience to be even more relevant and personalised to give members what they need, not what we think they need
- continue to be the authority on general practice standards and guidelines – the college will maintain its place as the standard-setter across the profession, guided by those at the coalface
- be the provider of choice for career-long learning – we understand GPs never stop learning, and we will provide members with the education and support they need, when they need it
- amplify our advocacy for the profession, the practice and the practitioner – we will work to see general practice has a seat at the table, and the profession is completely integrated into Australian healthcare policy

- transform to become a highly competitive and commercial organisation – members can be confident that we will have the financial strength to act for them and their patients
- encourage diversity to cultivate a respectful, supportive, safe, transparent and engaged team culture – an inclusive culture will empower RACGP employees to continue delivering members as much value as possible
- refocus our priorities to support exceptional healthcare across Australia, regardless of postcode – receiving high-quality healthcare should not be determined by where someone lives or their background, and we will strive to support GPs to better serve rural and remote patients and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander patients across Australia
- support high-quality general practice training, while making efficient and effective use of government funds to help address workforce challenges.

Public policy

The RACGP advocates to effect positive changes that support the delivery of high-quality general practice services across Australia. We forge productive relationships and work with related bodies and individuals, including state and federal governments and health ministers, the Australian Medical Association, the Australian College of Rural and Remote Medicine, the Rural Doctors' Association of Australia, the National Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Organisation, the National Health and Medical Research Council, the Australian Research Council, the Medical Research Future Fund, and Primary Health Networks.

General practice education and training

The RACGP provides education for over 90% of Australia's GPs in training, and actively engages with general practice supervisors and training organisations across the country.

Member professional support

The RACGP produces comprehensive clinical guidelines and standards to help GPs deliver quality care, and curates a range of member-centred goods and services for busy GPs.

Rural, regional and remote health

The RACGP is committed to rural, regional and remote Australia, supporting health outcomes and working to ensure an appropriate distribution and rural readiness of the general practice workforce.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health

The RACGP is an active and vocal advocate for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health, supporting GPs to provide high-quality, culturally responsive, patient-centred healthcare to one of Australia's most vulnerable patient groups.




