Answer 1

Digital mucous cyst.

Answer 2

These structures occur on the dorsal surface of the distal phalanx of middle aged and elderly patients. These cysts contain a clear viscous jelly-like substance that exudes if the cyst is incised.

Answer 3

Simple surgical removal leads to frequent recurrence with failure rates ranging from 25–100%. Injection with triamcinolone deep into the cyst is also associated with a high recurrence rate. The highest rate of cure has been reported with the simple technique of repeated punctures and expression of the cyst contents.
