ANSWERS TO JUNE BRAIN TEASER**Answer 1**

The films are T1 sagittal and T1 contrasted axial. There is a large extra-axial mass that shows typical meningioma features on MRI, with severe midline shift from right to left.

Answer 2

It should be noted that a frontal brain lesion can cause severe psychotic symptoms, which are often wrongly associated with depression or dementia in older people.

Answer 3

The patient was treated surgically – right frontal craniotomy and a total resection of the tumour. The symptoms of depression and headaches disappeared.
