


#### Summary report

The annual *General Practice: Health of the Nation* survey is specifically commissioned research, which this year involved 1782 RACGP Fellows from all parts of Australia. The online survey was undertaken by EY Sweeney in May 2020.


Each year, RACGP members select a topic of focus for the report. Our 2020 report focuses on the unique environment created by the SARS-CoV-2 (COVID-19) pandemic and the 2019–20 summer bushfires. GPs told us the most common patient presentations during COVID-195 were:

- psychological (eg depression, sleep disturbance)
- preventive (eg immunisation/vaccination, diet)
- respiratory (eg cough, asthma, sinusitis, suspected COVID-19)
- musculoskeletal (eg back/neck pain, arthritis)

GPs want the Australian Government to prioritise primary care funding, mental health and telehealth



# **Challenges faced by GPs** during the COVID-19 pandemic



### Mental health impact of COVID-19 on GPs



Telehealth use has increased significantly since the start of the pandemic



of GPs feel more positive toward using telehealth as a result of the pandemic<sup>5</sup> The main reasons for GPs feeling more positive toward using telehealth





The government is spending less on primary healthcare each year





